Deaths as winter hits Poland

Extreme weather brings parts of country to a standstill

At least 18 people died and transport chaos descended over the country as a cold front rollicking in from the north sent temperatures plummeting and dumped huge quantities of snow.

Police said most of the victims were homeless people with a drinking problem who had succumbed to hypothermia, and warned that more could die as emergency services struggled to cope with the sudden cold snap that left around 30 centimetres of snow across Poland.

As the snow fell, hundreds of thousands of people were caught up in a transport nightmare as road, rail and air links suffered.

In scenes similar to those at the country's regional airports, stressed passengers at Warsaw's Okęcie airport had to cope with delays and cancellations. Przemysław Przybylski, a spokesman for the airport authorities, said that Okęcie was "operating intermittently", explaining that often the runway required clearing after every landing.

Rail passengers fared little better as drifting snow blocked lines.

"We have about three thousand people on the tracks, and heavy equipment. We are doing everything possible to clear the tracks," said Krzysztof Lancucki, a spokesman for PKP.

"But there are also situations beyond our control," he added. "In Radom we had a lorry stuck on the snow that blocked a crossing."

On the roads benighted lorry drivers on a main artery road near Pruszków found themselves stuck in a traffic jam for 20 hours with little in the way of food and warmth. All regions reported that many roads were impassable at the height of the blizzards as drivers found that journeys that normally took only a few minutes lasted hours.

Municipal tram and bus networks toiled to keep routes operating, and those services that did work were often swamped with hapless drivers who had either abandoned their vehicles or decided to leave them at home.

The cold snap also played havoc with electricity and heating supplies.

At one point some 30,000 people in the town of Leszno had no heat due to network failures while 800 homes in Gliwice suffered a similar fate after a municipal heating system developed a fault.

Serial prostitute killer caught

Police in Upper Silesia have arrested a suspected serial killer who had been targeting prostitutes around the towns of Katowice and Tychy.

The 36-year-old homeless man was picked up following the murder of a prostitute around the night of November 10. The 50-year-old woman was reported missing by her friends after she failed to return.

A police search later found her body in woodland near a main road.

An examination revealed that her body bore signs of sexual intercourse and that she had been strangled by the killer's bare hands.

"The perpetrator strangled her, stuffing her mouth with leaves or whatever he could find on the ground," said Andrzej Galas, head of the Zabrze prosecutor's office.

In a striking development, the newspaper Gazeta Katowice said the man had confessed to murdering two other prostitutes, and a case of attempted murder.

"One woman survived because the attacker was scared off by a passerby," explained Mr Galas.

The possibility that the suspect may have killed and tried to kill other women in addition to the November victim was not raised at his court hearing, but a source cited by the newspaper said that all that attacks shared distinct similarities.

"The evidence we have of the other killings and the testimony of the woman who survived basically describe the latest case," said the source, apparently close to the investigation.

The body of one of the other women thought to be another of the alleged killer's victims was found last year in similar circumstances. The woman, a prostitute, had been strangled and dumped in bushes close to Bytom-Wroclaw road.

Police believe that the man, who has not yet been named, may well have targeted prostitutes on main roads in the Katowice region.

Just what drove the man to launch his alleged killing spree remains to be determined, but if found guilty the suspect faces life in jail.

While the news of the arrest of a possible serial killer may have triggered fears in some of the Polish population, these should have been allayed by news that Poland has one of the lowest murder rates in the European Union.

The country has 1.29 murders per 100,000 people, according to Eurostat, the union's statistical office.

Home explosions cause panic

One man died and at least eight were left injured after a gas explosion ripped through a block of flats in Zielona Gora on Tuesday evening.

According to reports by TVN, approximately 7,000 residents were evacuated from their homes, although most were eventually allowed to return before midnight.

"It's difficult to say what the exact problem was at this point," said Piotr Chorbotowicz, the director of the gas department that supplies the city. "The case is currently being investigated by the relevant departments and we will get answers."

But while the investigation has yet to provide any official reasons for the disaster, TVN has reported that the dozens of explosions could have been down to a technical failure in the pipelines. Another theory, as reported in daily Fakt, is that

there was a sudden increase of gas pressure, which the old installations were unable to cope with.

"Initial reports show that our people acted in the correct manner," Chorbotowicz told journalists. "As soon as we received the notification, we sent our team and the gas supply was cut off."

Vice President of Zielona Gora Dariusz Lesicki has also praised the speed with which the fire service and police arrived. "Within 12 minutes there were four fire brigade units on the scene."

However, despite assurances from the authorities, locals remain unconvinced.

"Thousands of peoples' lives were endangered due to this. How is it possible in this day and age that such things can occur," asked one angry resident. "My brother first heard about it on the radio, then the next thing people started to evacuate. Before that a lot of people didn't know what was going on."

Russia criticised in new Wikileaks

Comments made by Radek Sikorski about "Russian aggression" ruffled feathers in both Washington and Moscow, the latest batch of documents from Wikileaks have revealed.

In 2009 while on a visit to Washington, Mr Sikorski said that American forces should be deployed to Poland to "protect it against Russian aggression". He also said that war games involving Russian and Belarusian forces taking place at the time were directed against Poland.

The comments provoked a disappointed reaction from the United States. In a cable from the US embassy in Moscow, one diplomat said Russian officials has claimed that the remarks "not only harmed improved Polish relations but harmed US-Russian, and Russian-NATO relations".

By making his comments, the US believed that Mr Sikorski had "opened old disputes" and he had "added anti-Western elements in the Russian ammunition against improving relations between Russia and NATO, even the US".

The documents provided in the latest Wikileaks' tranche also revealed that Polish diplomats jokingly referred to their own Office of European Security as the Office of Threats from the East. One Polish diplomat later claimed that the Russians were aware of the unfortunate nickname, suggesting that the Russian security forces had bugged Warsaw's Moscow embassy.

The revelations of Mr Sikorski's remarks came just three days before the start of a much-heralded visit by Russian president Dmitry Medvedev, which many hope will build on Poland's flourishing relationship with its old adversary.

Warsaw's relations with Russia have improved markedly but substantial differences still remain.

The Russian envoy to the alliance said his country will reject NATO's proposed co-operation on missile defence if the alliance deploys missiles in Poland or the Baltic Sea. Poland is a keen supporter of the defence system, and has said it would like to include Russia in some form of an agreement.

Poland also remains a keen and enthusiastic supporter of spreading democratic values to the states of the old Soviet Union despite suspicions in Moscow of covert attempts to neuter its influence in its own backyard.

Despite this, the Russian ambassador to Warsaw said that his country's presidential visit to Warsaw should improve bilateral ties.

The allegations are now being investigated by official inspectors, but have been met with surprise from the commander who has offered a very different version of events.

One fire-fighter, who wished to remain anonymous, said the whole incident has brought negative attention to the town, but that that was never the intention.

"We just want an ordinary commander who behaves normally and does his job. This place might not be a church, but there must be a certain air of civilisation in the workplace."

Columbus had Polish father

A new biography has hit the shelves claiming that Christopher Columbus was the son of Polish King Wladyslaw III and a Portuguese noblewoman.

Author Manuel Rosa says he has proof that the history of the explorer, whose four voyages led to the European colonisation of the 'New World', includes a number of lies - one of which being the true identity of his father.

Respected ex-Dean of the University of Lisbon Prof. Joaquim Verissimo Serrao, states in the book's preface that he "agrees 100 percent" with the findings.

But Rosa, who works at Duke University in North Carolina, claims that it was never his intention to alter history. "I never started out to look for Columbus, it was Columbus who came looking for me."

OAP murderer found in Poland

Police in Krakow have found the 83-year-old lady who beat her neighbour to death in Austria.

Polish-born pensioner Bronislawa Jarosz was put under house arrest by the court after it was deemed she was too old and ill to serve her 18 year sentence behind bars.

However, after being allowed out, she fled the country and has since been detained by authorities in Krakow.

After being deported back to Austria, it is expected she will return to prison.

PJN names leaders

The new Law and Justice break-away party 'Poland is the Most Important' party ('Polska jest Najwazniejsza') has named its leaders.

Speaking after its first official meeting, Jacek Pilch said, "We have chosen the deputy leaders of the party. They are; Elzbieta Jakubiak, Jacek Tomczak, Wojciech Mojzesowicz and Pawel Poncylijusz."

"Unlike Law and Justice, our leadership includes representatives from different regions of the country."

Poland is the Most Important (PJN) Deputy Head Elzbieta Jakubiak has stated that the party's first congress will be held this month (believed to be December 12), during which the party's official political programme will be announced.

Christmas tree sellers branch out

Poles looking to decorate their homes over the festive period have been warned that Christmas tree prices may rocket by as much as 20 percent this year.

The increase is due to a large number of trees being exported abroad, where sellers are able to receive a higher price.

"Many in the business will take their goods abroad this year, so demand will be higher," explains seller Pawel Wocjick. "Growing is a time-consuming and expensive business and we receive no subsidies for the land."

Despite prices only rising from an average PLN 100 to PLN 120, daily Fakt reports that 2010 will see a lot more Polish homes replace traditional trees with artificial ones.

Dead baby comes to life

A woman who gave birth to a still-born baby has made headlines after her child miraculously came back to life.

Anna Lewandowska (33) from the eastern village of Siemianowa was in her backyard when she began getting pains in her chest. Unable to make it indoors, she was forced to give birth outside, but was horrified to find that her child did not move.

"I had my daughter in the yard," Ms Lewandowska told daily Fakt. "But she didn't move or make a sound. I was just left holding her and crying."

Ms Lewandowska's neighbours called for the authorities. "They took me inside and phoned the police. They just waited with me, not even trying to save my baby," she said angrily. "But when the police arrived, the child suddenly came to life."

"The child had bruises on its little hands and face," said Grzegorz Wawryszak, a spokesman for the Lodzkie Regional Po-

lice. "As officers began filling in the required documents, it started to move in front of them."

Ms Lewandowska, a single parent who already has six children, said that she was too busy to go for check-ups, but argues that she felt perfectly fine.

"I have a lot of responsibilities and very little time so I had not been going to the doctor. But I gave birth to my last child at home, so I was confident things were going well."

The baby, who was born three months premature and weighs only 4.6 lb (2,100 grams), is now in intensive care and doctors are fighting to keep it healthy.

"I have already given her a name," added Ms Lewandowska. "Marysia. After Our Lady who was watching over us."

There is a rift within the lute here at NPE. A few weeks back, one of my fellow columnists (I shall name no names, but he has a

Sauerkraut murder appeal begins



The appeal in the case of a Lublin woman who murdered five of her children, storing the bodies in plastic

barrels used for storing sauerkraut, began this week. Lawyers are trying to overturn guilty verdicts from the original trial that led to the mother being sentenced to 25 years in prison, her husband to 8 years for collusion.

The case came to light in 2003 when the bodies were discovered by one of the couple's daughters, who had been asked to get rid of the barrels, which were beginning to stink. Between 1992-1998 Jolanta K. gave birth to five children at home in the bath, drowning the infants immediately

after. The bodies were first stored in the freezer, then after the family moved from Lublin, they ended up in the plastic barrels.

The appeal is the latest in a long line of trials and appeals in the case. The statements of the couple are conflicting, each accusing the other of the major role in the events. Jolanta K. maintains her husband forced her to get rid of the unwanted children, while Andrzej K. insists he didn't even know his wife had been pregnant.

Container families won't move

Five families still stuck in shipping containers following the summer's floods in Wilkow are refusing to move out, despite the Regional Governor threatening to leave them high and dry. "The containers aren't suitable accommodation in winter, so we aren't going to continue paying for them. They're trying to heat them somehow, but staying in a container when it's more than minus ten outside is life-threatening." Henryka Strojnowska, the Vice-Governor told Radio Tok FM.

A dozen or so families in Wilkow were still homeless before winter hit. Most moved in with relatives, others are in rented accommodation paid for by the authorities. The remaining five families have also had places set aside for them in a local school. So far, though, none has taken the offer up.

EU cash up for grabs

Lubelskie is in with a chance of PLN 100 mln in extra EU funds, if the region can demonstrate it is using enough of the cash available for infrastructure development. The region was in danger of failing to achieve the targets set by the EU as major projects in the region have yet to get underway.

"The number of completed local government investments snowballed during autumn. It seems the mayors and presidents felt the hot breath of the voters on their necks with the elections approaching," Bogdan Kawalko, director of regional development, commented.

Dolnoslaski police this week arrested 17 people involved in a massive diesel fraud operation. "The group bought fuel oil in large quantities,

The fuel oil was then resold as diesel, following a process to remove dye, at several filling stations in Lower Slask and other regions of the country. In this manner over 5.5 mln litres of fuel oil were sold on, to a value of PLN 7.5 mln. It is estimated that the Treasury lost as much as PLN 5 mln as a

direct result of the group's activities.

The capital's other major side, Polonia, is apparently uninterested in moving there, despite having a smaller, less modern stadium.

The stadium will need to generate around PLN 30 mln a year just to cover

running costs, and with the national team only playing six home matches a year, there will be a significant shortfall. Even those six matches are not guaranteed. Rafal Kapler, director of the National Sport Centre, would only confirm that talks are under way regarding the national team. This would leave the stadium basically as a white elephant.

The only saving grace is the 8,000m² of office space in the stadium, including a state of the art conference centre capable of seating 2,000 people. Kapler argued it would be a great place to work, on account of the excellent transport connections, including the new metro and a special rail link to the airport.

The stadium could also host a variety of non-sporting events, the retractable roof being of particular benefit in hosting various concerts. "We're talking to various promoters who might be interested in organising large events at the stadium," Kapler continued.

Bus and train collide

Warsaw bus number 133 was hit by a train on a level crossing this Thursday afternoon, seven people being injured in the incident, one seriously. The incident took place on a level crossing in Bialoleka, the train smashing into the back of the bus. The driver explained how, after the collision, he was too terrified to turn around and see what had happened. Fortunately, the bus had only just left the depot and there were few passengers aboard.

The accident occurred while the barriers to the crossing were raised. "Inquiries are underway to establish how this happened. The barriers are definitely operational, because they were lowered on our recommendation, so that no one could enter the crossing. The barriers are raised and lowered by the signalman," Wojciech Piaseczny, of Warsaw police, told reporters. The bus was hit by the 'Norwid' express, which runs from Gdansk to Krakow, leading to delays on the rail as well as road network.

Lady arsonist arrested



A series of arson attacks over the last month in the village of Lenart, near Olecko, led to the arrest this week of a 42-year-old woman, a resident

of the village. The fires began at the beginning of November, with farm buildings the first two targets. Panic quickly spread through the area, with extra police patrols and locals being especially vigilant.

In one of the first fires over seventy pigs were burned to death. Matters got even worse though, when the arsonist began a further four attacks to target people's homes, one family awaking in the middle of the night to find their home full of smoke, and a large stump of wood burning at the front door.

Olecko police designated several officers to investigate the attacks and they soon arrested the local woman, to the general astonishment of her friends and neighbours. "It's unbelievable, we kept watch together, we fought the fires together, I thought she was normal," commented one stunned neighbour to reporters from TVN24.

Police say the woman has confessed so far to only two of the attacks, but the interrogation is proceeding slowly due to the woman repeatedly changing her story.

Insanity defence in Wrobel murder



Grzegorz W., who is accused of murdering his father, ex-transport minister Eugeniusz Wrobel, has been declared

criminally insane by psychiatrists examining the 30-year-old man. This means he will not be tried, but will instead be confined to a secure psychiatric institution. "The expert diagnosis is clear, he doesn't understand the significance of his acts, did not act with premeditation and is not fit to stand trial," Jacek Slawik, Rybnik's regional prosecutor, told reporters.

As for the crime itself, Slawik elaborated, "He stabbed his father several times in the neck and shoulder, then stabbed him over a dozen times in the abdomen." He then dragged his father's body to the bathroom where he spread out some plastic sheeting and proceeded to hack the body to pieces with an electric chainsaw. He then placed the pieces into plastic bin liners and spent up to an hour cleaning the bathroom and the room where the murder took place.

Grzegorz W. then dumped his father's remains in Rybnik Reservoir and threw the chainsaw into a rubbish bin on his housing estate in Katowice. Police have so

far succeeded in recovering several parts of the body of the ex-minister, the chainsaw was most likely taken by scrap metal collectors.

Grzegorz W. was arrested a few days after his father's disappearance and was remanded in custody as police feared he could try to escape to the USA, for which he held a valid visa. He will now be incarcerated in a psychiatric hospital for an indefinite period and if doctors decide he has made a sufficient recovery at some point in the future, he could be released.

CBS raid GDDKiA

Officers from the Central Investigative Agency (CBS) raided the offices of the General Directorate of National Roads and Motorways (GDDKiA) in Katowice in connection with a series of anomalies regarding the construction of the A1 motorway. The main investigation concerns the theft of large quantities of hardcore dolomite from the motorway's construction site with a value of about PLN 1 mln. However, the CBS is also looking into the tender process, and how the company Dragados, which doesn't own a single piece of building equipment, managed to win a government contract worth half a billion zloty.

Air defence update

With Poland's out-of-date air defence system in desperate need of an update, the Ministry of Defence is currently weighing up its two options; whether to buy from abroad, or construct one using home produced means.

It would cost an estimated PLN 20 mln to build a new anti-missile system from scratch, but it is an option that defence expert from the Euro-Atlantic Association Tomasz Badowski says the country should certainly consider.

"We have a choice. We can either buy a new system from a country such as the US or Israel, or use what we have and

construct it ourselves. Our equipment, which is used by countries such as Indonesia, is just as good as foreign installations, and around 30 percent cheaper."

He also states that, whatever the final decision may be, right now is the time to act.

"We are currently applying methods that date back to Soviet times, and these methods will be too old to function within five years."

Janusz Sejmej, a spokesman for the Ministry, is in full agreement. "We are running out of time and we will certainly not be waiting around until the present system fails."

New bout of bad meat

Poland meat exporters have come under fire from the Ukrainian Committee of Veterinary Medicine after claims that E. Coli has been found in various meat products.

The news comes just one week after approximately 20 tons of Polish chicken breasts exported to Slovakia were said to contain salmonella.

However Deputy Chief Veterinary Officer in Poland Krzysztof Jazdzewski has expressed his surprise over the new allegations, claiming that his department

has yet to receive any official information from Ukrainian authorities.

According to newspaper 'Kommersant-Ukraine', the price of imported pork is, on average, 5.2 percent lower than the price of pork in the Ukraine.

"For this reason, it is doubtful that the committee will introduce a total ban on Polish meat products," said Serhij Nalywka of one of the consulting Ukrainian firms. "It is likely that these sanctions will be limited to only some Polish companies.

Poland's GDP overtaken

A new report reveals that Poland's GDP rate is dropping behind a number of its neighbours, including Slovakia, Germany and Sweden.

According to predictions by the EC, the highest rate for 2010 is expected to come from Sweden and Slovakia with 4.8 percent and 4.1 percent respectively. These figures mean Poland's predicted 3.5 percent leaves the country lagging behind.

In its bi-annual report, the EC states that it expects a general drop in GDP throughout Europe next year.

"The economic recovery has taken hold," says Olli Rehn, EU Commissioner for Economic and Monetary Affairs.

"However, this recovery is uneven and many member states are going through a difficult period of adjustment."

Bad year for insurance

2010 has been the worst year for property insurance companies since Poland was hit by floods in 1997 according to Parkiet.com.

In total, it is predicted that the largest firms are down PLN 1 bln on last year, with market leader PZU down PLN 333.8 mln alone.

The website reports that next year will see a 10 percent rise in motor insurance and increased home insurance rates.

SOMETHING FOR THE WEEKEND from In Your Pocket



First off, read last week's column again, then type 'snow' 'chaos' 'Britain' into Google. It will make you proud you live in Eastern Europe.

Back home in Romania this week we were caught out on Wednesday (December 1st) by Romania's National Holiday. We had forgotten all about it, as had most of the country. The place still came grinding to a halt though, much like Britain after a dusting of snow. Without boring you with too much history, December 1st was the day in 1918 when the Romanians of Transylvania voted to join Wallachia and Moldavia - the rump of Romania - creating to all intents and purposes the country we have today. (It should be noted for the record that the two and a half million Hungarians living in Transylvania were not consulted).

Anyway, December 1st has been celebrated as Romania's National Day since 1990. Lech freeze out Juve

Lech Poznan secured advance from the group stages of the Europa League this Wednesday evening, eliminating Italian giants Juventus in a match which was in every possible way extraordinary. There was massive doubt whether the match would even go ahead, with air temperatures of -15 and a wind-chill factor of -31! Chuck blizzard conditions into the mix and you have every reason to abandon the game. But UEFA were adamant they play, so play they did.

When the match began, the players were all wearing extra layers. By half time, the pitch markings had to be repainted in a fetching pink and the white ball changed for an orange one. By the hour mark the pitch had disappeared, after 70 minutes Manninger in the Juve goal appeared to be hypothermic, after 80 minutes you could hardly see the players. Any worse and Lech should have appointed [Joe Simpson](#) manager, not Jose Bakero.

Throughout the entire match Poznan played fantastic, disciplined, intelligent football. Compact in defence, they sprang into attack with clever movement on the counter and, when necessary, retained possession and frustrated their more illustrious guests. They won the midfield battle, players like Kikut and Arboleda put their bodies on the line, and in Stilic and Peszko, they had the game's outstanding players. Even the normally heart-attack

inducing keeper Kotorowski enjoyed a good game. Juve were outclassed across the pitch.

Lech took a deserved lead in the 12th minute after Peszko cleverly won a corner. Stilic whipped it in and Rudnevs rose to meet it at the near post, beating a hapless Manninger. After that Lech continued to have the better chances, Juve only rarely threatening.

Lech almost came to rue not converting those chances, though, when an increasingly desperate Juve equalised in the 84th minute following a hopeful punt upfield - real route one stuff that continental sophisticates are supposed not to employ. Even then, Lech didn't panic, continued pressing high up the pitch and calmly stroked the ball around once they'd won it.

Then, in the last ten seconds of the match, Juve won a free kick on the edge of the penalty area by the byline. The tension was incredible - surely, this heroic performance couldn't go unrewarded? Thankfully, Kotorowski rose majestically to claim the ball, massive cheers erupting round the packed stadium as he fell to the pitch clutching the orange orb. Truly remarkable. While it is still possible for Juve to finish level on points with Lech after the last round of group games, Lech's better head-to-head record against Juve (2 draws with Lech having scored 3 in Turin) guarantees their progression to the last 32.

No dialogue at the Dialog

A fan of Zagłębie Lubin was attacked and severely beaten by a fan of the same team, following last weekend's match against Lechia Gdansk (which Zagłębie lost 3-1). The incident is a reflection of the increasing conflict at the inappropriately named Dialog Arena where Zagłębie play. The injured fan wanted to break away from recent protests against the club's owners, currently being steered by a group of fanatical supporters occupying a sector of the

stadium nicknamed 'the vanguard'.

The protest has taken silent form at recent matches, with fans not reacting to events on the pitch, but last weekend it went further. After Zagłębie scored, fans chanted at their own players, 'why are you f**ing scoring, you'll be f**ing sacked in the morning'. A spokesperson for the protesting fans commented, "We've made our position clear. The club knows what we think, but nobody's talking to us."

Managerial merry-go-round

Ex-Lech Poznan manager Jacek Zielinski looks set to return to his former stamping ground, Polonia Warszawa, as Sporting Director in the near future. There he will assist manager Pawel Janas in building a team that was supposed to win the Ekstraklasa already this year, but which has faltered following a strong start. The manager that Polonia dumped while they were still top of the league, Jose Bakero, replaced Zielinski at Lech Poznan and dedicated Wednesday's win over Juventus to Zielinski, stating,

"The contribution he made to this victory cannot be underestimated."

Kuszczak gives up the fight

Tomasz Kuszczak looks set to leave Manchester United after an unhappy four years in which he has failed to convince Sir Alex Ferguson of his ability to hold the number one spot. The agreement to buy Danish keeper Anders Lindegaard has been the final straw for the Pole who has decided not to stay and fight for the number one spot with the Dane,

once Edwin Van Der Saar steps down at the end of the season. Since arriving at Old Trafford in 2006, Kuszczak has played a mere 55 games for the Red Devils and failed to establish himself as a serious rival to the ageing Van der Sar. Kuszczak was in goal for this week's humiliating exit from the Carling Cup, in which a weakened Man Utd lost 4-0 to West Ham. Kuszczak couldn't really be faulted for any of the goals, though, as he was left hopelessly exposed by the youthful back four in front of him.
